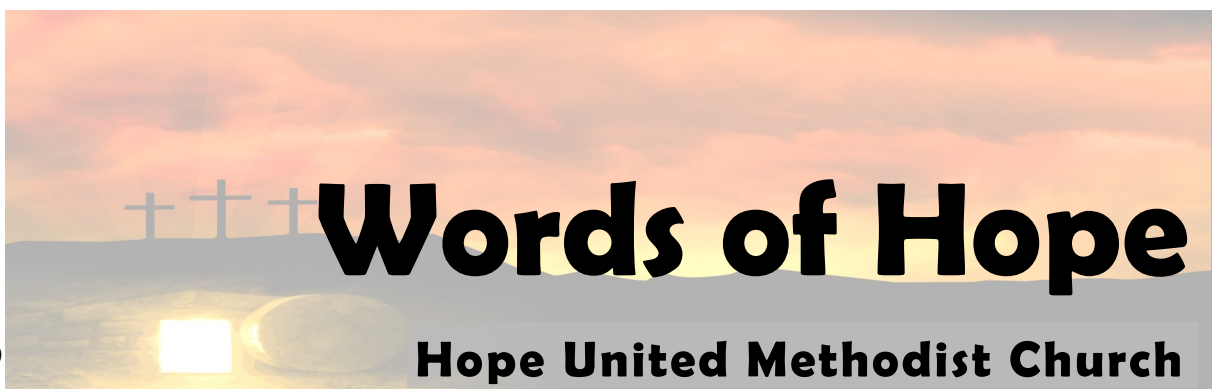

## *From Sarah, with love...*

Being a pastor is a wonderful job. In fact, I believe it is the best job in the world. And being a pastor is hard. If a pastor ever tells you, "it was a crazy day," believe her; she's not talking about deadlines or a presentation or office politics, she's talking about ministering to folks in jail, facing death, or a hideous plumbing issue. The job is difficult for another almost equally inexplicable reason—the pressure involved with the work is grueling. This pressure, or pull? Or squeeze, comes of being one body, the result of living with opposing limbs that seemingly work only to wrench each other apart. The Church is a very large tent, or a mansion, to get biblical with it, with many rooms and these rooms, well, do not always see eye to eye. The longer I work in the Church, the more profound this "unity" becomes. Within the body we genuinely disagree and some parts of us are, in my humble opinion, totally bananas. Even so, we are connected.

This conflict is honest, and glorious to behold and I accept it, though at times it feels precisely like saying, "yes, I agree to being pulled apart at the seams for the rest of my life." And comparing. It feels like I spend much of my life comparing myself, our church to all those "other" churches. You know, the bigger ones.

And so I feel the incessant drive to grow and thrive and be successful. Success always looks like exactly what I do not have: rock bands, book deals, stadiums or warehouses of people, podcasts, money. It makes me not want to look at anyone's church website again, ever. I know Hope Church wants and needs to be vital and vitality means more people, more people who know the love of God, more people

touched by the gospel, more people working for good in the world, and underneath it all it feels like more, more, more when all I want to do is simplify.

The job and my effectiveness in it require success. I get it; who doesn't want to save souls or help people and yet my soul is yearning for peace and calm. I am not peaceful and calm as I clamor for more, more, more.

Can we share the good news of the love Jesus and not build a mega church to go with it? How do we sustain ourselves in ministry and remain authentic to the ministry of Jesus?

What the planet needs is for more and more people to commit themselves to what Naomi Klein calls, "managed degrowth." I think Jesus calls for this, too. We have, to paraphrase Naomi Klein again, "a system that fetishizes growth above all else regardless of the human or ecological consequences, while failing to place value on those things we cherish above all—a decent standard of living, a future hope, and relationships with one another."

I do know that my soul, my heart of hearts wants less and less and I know my soul is waiting for the rest of me to get on board (just how many tank tops do I need?). My soul, this part that is actually the heart of my job, is delighted with what I have: my perfect parsonage, my adorable dogs, my books, *Queer Eye for the Straight Guy* episodes on Netflix, delicious food, walks in the evening, hymns every Sunday, the challenges of caring for a congregation, and yes, some cute clothes. All these things sheer gift and grace from God, and in the presence of all of this abundance I

cannot I dare not narrow my eyes and expect or require any more. The joy is mine! The kind of prosperity I have from this kind of joy is not dependent upon its growth.

So, I do not understand the lights and sounds of churches with multiplication pastors when the cry of the planet, the very body of God, is for us, for all of us, to consume less.

We envision a different future, a future built upon co-operation and repentance and joy. We envision a future that springs from death. For freedom Christ has made us free.

So, What does freedom look like? And what would it mean for our community of faith to grow?

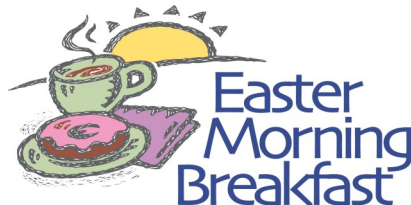
## CHUM Dinner THANK YOU'S

**DIDJA KNOW** we, Hope UMC, have been very fortunate over the years to have been able to respond to a variety of situations that were, to say the least, unexpected or unplanned. I recall one such event that caused great concern. While we had planned well for the addition of our elevator, we were caught totally unaware,,, and unprepared... to deal with the news that the ceiling area had taken on a great deal of water due to a roof leak and the insulation was totally saturated to the point that there was fear of it collapsing. How best to proceed was soon the major topic of discussion. Folks in leadership roles got together, learned what needed to be done, talked over options and put plans together for the rest of the congregation to consider, discuss and finally approve. We moved forward together.

**DIDJA KNOW** that in some ways we are in a similar situation. With the news of University Nursery School terminating its lease, we find that we were unprepared for the changes it brought. How best to proceed is again the question. Fortunately folks in leadership roles have worked together to talk about options and plans for the rest of the congregation to consider before deciding how to proceed. Plans have not been completed, but it is proper that the congregation hear more details and ask questions about what comes next.

**DIDJA KNOW** that two more listening sessions will be held soon to clarify and expand plans. We encourage members and friends to participate so all of us have full information about what needs to be done and how it will be done in a timely and well managed way. Again we will move forward together.

### Missions/Outreach News

Missions activities have been somewhat low key during the month of March, but we have great news to share!

In the fall of 2018, Pastor Sarah took note of some homeless folks regularly seen around West Duluth Super One and offered a ride to one of them. Her experience prompted a call for more mission activity to help the homeless -> notably, our Blessing Bag campaign. Later, Brad Mackinaw carried that campaign with him to the Twin Cities when he was there for job training. While on a bike ride along the MN river, he discovered a homeless encampment and brought supplies to them – tent and sleeping bags. He also encountered an athletic team from Lakeville High School, the members of which were very impressed with the campaign. He accomplished his mission goal AND spawned a new ministry through those students at Lakeville HS, prompting a thank you letter from the coach. In the wake of this successful Blessing Bag introduction, I discovered a MN Conference program of “micro grants” for congregations and filled out an application to extend and fund this activity for the next year. Around March 1, we received word that we have been awarded a \$2500 grant! We will plan carefully and begin our 2019 Blessing Bag campaign this fall with sturdier bags, and a lot of wool socks!

In March, the AD Council approved our proposal to go ahead with planning for a new Care Team at Hope, utilizing the experience of congregation members who have been visiting members all along. Watch for more news about this endeavor!

As rummage sales pick up in the spring, don't forget to look for pristine infant and toddler clothing for the Bethany Crisis Nursery. Also, planning will get underway for our next CHUM dinner soon. In April, we will resume our scheduled monthly meetings on the second Tuesday of the month, April 9, at 4:30 PM. We will discuss our ongoing Missions and new plans.

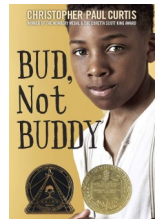

### ...from Jennifer

Having served Hope Church as one of your Administrative Assistants the past twenty-nine months has been a wonderful experience of learning and growing! Having grown up United Methodist with a UM ordained parent, and having served nearly four years in the Federated Church of Morris that is both UMC and UCC aligned, it was a homecoming of sorts for me. I greatly appreciate having gained the perspective of being at that "front desk," and realize even more just what I appreciate about the best church secretaries, as well as the reality that no one ever does every aspect of the position (or any other one, I'm sure) with equal perfection. Most of all I will cherish getting to know some remarkable people of great commitment, deep faith, and a desire to live life as God calls.

I am also leaving the pastoral position with the Duluth Congregational Church, having accepted a three-quarter time interim pastorate with a United Church of Christ congregation in northern Illinois for a minimum one-year commitment. I expect to supplement that position with consulting, or work with a nearby organic CSA (community-supported agriculture) farm, or whatever else I may find. Thank you for all your support. Thank you for your patience and understanding as I learned new skills -- and in the areas I never really mastered! I know you will extend the same kindness to Beth as she learns the areas I have been covering. And I leave you with blessing. Hope is in a challenging season, with many major changes in a short timeframe. From where I have sat, with the eyes of a seasoned pastor specializing in working with churches in transition times, I know there is anxiety, uncertainty, even frustration, anger and fear at times. These are some of the ways we respond in transition times. But I also know Hope has some incredibly gifted and faithful leaders and members. I know you have been through multiple seasons of change. And I know God loves you, and deeply desires to deepen your faith and maturity through this season, and to reach out to your neighborhood and the community of Duluth through the church called Hope. If God can nudge me, like Abraham and Sarah, to leave what is sure for what is not, I know God can nudge you into a new kind of future -- and will go there with you, all the way! I hold you in God's Light .
